What are the Online Safety risks when using games consoles?



Content: age-inappropriate material can be available to children in games and through online services

Some games might not be suitable for your child's age - they may contain violent or sexually-explicit content. The quality of graphics in many games is very high, so the games can appear very realistic. Many devices allow users to browse the internet, and watch films and TV, and some of the content available is not appropriate for children.

Contact: potential contact from someone who may wish to bully or abuse them

Many games allow gamers to play against people online, potentially from all around the world. While gaming you can communicate with people by text, voice or video chat. This might mean your child is exposed to offensive or aggressive language from other players. Bullying can also happen, which is known as 'griefing' in games, when players single out others specifically to make their gaming experience less enjoyable. Young people can also make themselves vulnerable to contact by those with a sexual interest in children if they give out their personal details.

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Conduct: children may be at risk because of their own and others' behaviour

Specific conduct risks for gamers include excessive use to the detriment of other aspects of their lives. This is sometimes referred to as 'addiction'. Gamers also need to think about their own behaviour and attitude towards other players, as well as the importance of not sharing any personal information.

Commercialism: young people can be unaware of hidden costs and advertising

There have been cases where children and young people have got into difficulty by inadvertently running up bills when playing games online. Some young people may also not be aware of advertising in games, for example, within the game there might be a billboard advertising a real-life product, or the whole game might be designed to promote particular products or brands.

Do you know how to protect your child?





- Keeping your personal details private. Use a nickname instead of your real name and always ask your parents before giving out your name, address or phone number online.
- Not sharing your username or password with anyone.
- . Thinking before you post. Once posted, it can be difficult to remove.
- Not posting things that you don't want others to know about or that you wouldn't say to their face.
- Being respectful of other people's content that you post or share. For example, a
 photo that your friend took is their property, not yours. You should post it online
 only if you have their permission.

What can I do to support my child being safe online?



- Encourage open dialogue with your child.
- Have a family agreement about which sites can and cannot be used
- Consider filtering & blocking certain sites / software, set up privacy restrictions
- Encourage children to think before they post or share and ensure they know how to protect their personal information
- Adhere to age setting for sites, apps and games
- Understand the law, where and how you can get support
- Save any evidence and report incidents

Parental Controls





Parental controls can restrict the content that can be purchased or downloaded.



Use Restrictions on your iPhone, iPad, and iPod touch

You can use Restrictions, also known as parental controls, to block or limit specific apps and features on your iPhone, iPad, or iPod touch, including access to explicit content in the iTunes Store.

- 1. Open your apps list and tap on the Settings icon.
- Scroll down the settings page until you find Users, then press on it. On tablets like Samsung's, you might need to tap on the General tab at the top of the screen first.
- Choose to add a new profile by tapping on the small icon of a person next to the magnifying glass in the top-right corner. As we're setting this up as a child's account, touch restricted profile.
- 4. At this stage you may be asked to set up a PIN or passcode for your user account. This will only appear if you haven't already secured your profile, and is necessary in order to stop your children bypassing parental controls by simply logging into the phone as you.
- 5. You will now see a list of all the apps currently installed on your tablet. Scroll down this list, adding a **tick** next to each app you want to block access to. When ticked, the app is allowed.
- 6. The account is now set up, ready for your children to use! To access the new profile, lock your tablet. When you go to unlock it again, the screen will display icons for each user profile in the top-right corner. Tap on your child's profile name to sign in as them. Any apps you turned on in the previous step will be accessible. Any others won't appear and can't be accessed until you switch users at the lock screen.

Kiddle is a **kid safe visual search engine**. The boxes below illustrate how Kiddle returns results for each query (in the order shown):

Safe sites and pages written specifically for kids. Handpicked and checked by Kiddle editors.

Typically, results 1-3.

Safe, trusted sites that are not written specifically for kids, but have content written in a simple way, easy for kids to understand. Handpicked and checked by Kiddle editors.

Typically, results 4-7.

Safe, famous sites that are written for adults, providing expert content, but are harder for kids to understand. Filtered by Google safe search.

Typically, results 8 onwards.


Since Kiddle results are either handpicked and checked by our editors or filtered by Google safe search, you know you get kid-oriented results without any explicit content. In case some bad words are present in a search query, our guard robot will block the search.

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



Childnet: Childnet International is a non-profit organisation working in partnership with others around the Childnet world to help make the internet a great and safe place for children. The Childnet website hosts all the International online resources detailed below, as well as a number of recommended resources for young people, parents, carers and teachers. The Parents and Carers area also contains key advice, information on reporting and detailed information on a range of e-safety topics in the Hot topics section.



South West Grid for Learning: The South West Grid for Learning (SWGfL) is a not for profit, charitable trust dedicated to the advancement of education through information and communication technologies. 


Advice about smartphones, gaming devices, tablets and other internet-connected devices like the iPod Touch.
